There are some items that you can't bring to Kangaroo Island

Please dispose of any restricted items before travelling to KI. Use the quarantine bins or contact the appropriate agency for assistance with the disposal of restricted items. *Severe penalties apply.*

Honey products



Potatoes

Bees, bee handling equipment and honey products can spread disease, threatening a significant KI industry.

Unwashed or dirty potatoes can introduce diseases that could devastate the Island's seed potato industry. Potatoes in new packaging are permitted for consumption only.

Deer and ferrets cannot be brought to the Island.

Grape vine cuttings from interstate must be accompanied by a Plant Health Certificate or a Plant Health Assurance Certificate. Help keep our vineyards disease free.

Other things you can do to help

- Soil and residual plant material on your vehicle, clothing or camping equipment may harbour weed seeds or soil diseases like Phytophthora. Make sure all plant and equipment is thoroughly cleaned before coming to KI.
- Marine pests are a major threat to our pristine coastal waters. Antifoul your boat and clean all equipment carefully before travelling to the Island. If you have brought a fouled boat to the Island, please check your hull and if you find any unfamiliar attachments don't remove them, but please notify the Natural Resources Centre.
